Headquartered in Hamilton, Bermuda, Butterfield offers a range of community banking and bespoke financial services from eight leading international financial centres, supported by service centres in Canada and Mauritius. Butterfield serves international clients from Bermuda, the Cayman Islands, Guernsey and Jersey, where our principal banking operations are located, and The Bahamas, Switzerland, Singapore and the United Kingdom, where we offer specialised financial services. Banking services comprise deposit, cash management and lending solutions for individual, business and institutional clients. Wealth management services are composed of trust, private banking, asset management and custody. In Bermuda, the Cayman Islands, Guernsey and Jersey, we offer both banking and wealth management. In The Bahamas, Singapore and Switzerland, we offer select wealth management services. In the UK, we offer residential property lending. Butterfield is publicly traded on the New York Stock Exchange (symbol: NTB) and the Bermuda Stock Exchange (symbol: NTB.BH).

Our Strategy

Butterfield is pursuing a strategy to promote long-term growth while maintaining a strong capital and liquidity profile. A central tenet of that strategy is to build upon our relationship-based business approach by delivering exceptional client services.

Recent Developments

The first quarter of 2022 was an excellent start to the year, with the Bank's asset sensitive balance sheet benefiting from the initial increases in interest rates, resulting in improved net interest income and net interest margin. Butterfield expects market interest rates to continue to provide upward momentum to earnings during 2022.

Additionally, the Bank is seeing signs of improving economic activity across its operating jurisdictions, including growing visitor numbers, the return of cruise ships and increasing airlift to Bermuda and Cayman. While not yet back to prepandemic levels, visitor numbers are continuing to improve as travel restrictions are lifted and tourists once again seek high-quality destinations.

Capital management continues to be an important focus for Butterfield, including a sustainable quarterly dividend, support for organic growth and potential acquisitions and the flexibility to repurchase shares when appropriate.

The Bank maintained its balanced capital return policy. The Board again declared a quarterly dividend of \$0.44 per common share to be paid on May 31, 2022 to shareholders of record on May 16, 2022. During the first quarter of 2022, Butterfield repurchased 0.1 million common shares under the Bank's current share repurchase plan.
